Waterfront Director



Responsible to: Summer Program Manager/Program Director

Function: Provide training to staff regarding waterfront safety and oversee all aquatic activity.

Specific Responsibilities

- A. Orientation
 - a. Train staff in waterfront safety techniques during pre-camp training and throughout the summer.
 - b. Acquaint everyone at camp with an efficient and recommended plan for emergencies at the waterfront such as the lost swimmer drill (LSD), water rescues, backboard, etc.
- B. Provide instruction to Campers
 - a. Acquaint campers with the waterfront rules and safety procedures on the first day of each session
 - b. Participate in developing a chapel presentation.
- C. Provide Leadership for All Waterfront Functions
 - a. Cabin Activities
 - i. Consult with the Tripping Director and ensure enough lifeguards are available for all planned water activities.
 - ii. Prepare necessary equipment for activities, such as innertubes, beach balls, water polo, canoes, etc.
 - iii. It is required to be in the water when cabins are canoeing or tubing to the sandbar. An assigned aquatic observer will stay on the dock for observation.
 - b. Free Swim Activities
 - i. Supervisee waterfront safety check: buddy calls, buddy board, LSD and raft tests.
 - ii. Directly supervise aquatic observers while they are on duty. Correct any digressions.
 - c. Afternoon Classes
 - i. Plan an effective waterfront instruction program to benefit campers.
 - ii. Teach two swimming classes each day during the course of each session.
 - iii. Encourage and support campers (and staff) through their swimming experiences with things like going under water, floating, bobbing, etc.

D. Provide leadership for safety and maintenance as assigned

- a. Consult with Summer Program Specialist regarding questionable weather conditions impacting any waterfront activities.
- b. Check first aid kit and waterfront equipment each morning. Ensure program and safety equipment is in place, start the motorboat and other duties as assigned.
- c. Check swimming area for dangerous objects (nails, fishhooks, rocks, etc). Fix any problems. Report any concerns to the Site Caretaker and Summer Program Specialist.
- d. Periodically rake swimming area.
- e. Sweep chapel steps every morning before chapel as needed.
- f. Maintain an organized and clean equipment storage shed.
- E. Maintain and revise "Waterfront Role" notebook for next summer session.



Other Camp Responsibilities

- A. Take part in camp's Passion Play which will be presented to the campers each session.
- B. Participate in lunch devotions, evening activities and teach two classes.
- C. Write a letter daily to a camper in your assigned support cabin.
- D. Attend prayer times (beginning of cabin cleanup and rest period).
- E. Assist with camp projects and activities as time permits.
- F. Assist with taking down chairs and tables before and after church or special events.
- G. Assist with cabin activity preparations and rest period work projects.
- H. As assigned, participate in chapel and find a replacement if absent.
- I. Assist with other activities as time permits.

Essential Functions

- 1. Ability to communicate and train staff and campers in safety regulations and emergency procedures.
- 2. Visual and auditory ability to identify and respond to environmental and other hazards related to the activity.
- 3. Ability to communicate and work with groups participating and provide necessary instruction to campers and staff.
- 4. Abilities to observe camper and staff behavior, assess its appropriateness, enforce appropriate safety regulations and emergency procedures, and apply appropriate behavior-management techniques.
- 5. Cognitive and communication abilities to plan and conduct the activity to achieve camper development objectives.
- 6. Physical strength to swim and canoe/kayak and teach campers how to swim and canoe/kayak.
- 7. Physical ability to respond appropriately to situations requiring rescuing a drowning person, providing first aid, CPR and/or spinal injury.
- 8. Cognitive and communication abilities to supervise and lead peers as aquatic observers.
- 9. Ability to train staff in waterfront procedures and policies.
- 10. Ability to follow state health, fire, and ACA regulations.

Qualifications

- 1. Minimum 21 years of age
- Current certification in CPR for the Professional Rescuer, Lifeguard Training, Waterfront Lifeguard, Basic Watercraft Safety, and preferably Head Lifeguard or Lifeguard Management certified
- 3. Knowledge of camp, ACA policies, DHS and other government regulations pertaining to water activities
- 4. Knowledgeable of all camp policies, procedures and programs, and curriculum development
