Past staff also were able to hear about current opportunities to reconnect with the ministry of Tall Turf. The day would not have been complete without gathering around the piano to praise God while singing favorite songs from camp that are still sung by campers today.

2019 Spring Break College and Justice Tour

While many students spent their spring break sleeping in and relaxing, students from Tall Turf, Madison Square Christian Reformed Church, and New City Kids spent their break exploring their future on the 2019 College and Justice Tour.

This unique opportunity allowed students to visit a variety of different colleges and universities including two Historically Black Colleges and Universities, a division one university, and a private Christian university. Stu-

dents were able to learn about the history of the Tuskegee Airmen on a visit to Tuskegee University in Alabama, as well as the pioneering work of civil rights activist Dr. Mary Mcleod Bethune, who established Bethune-Cookman University in Florida. A quote below a statue of Dr. Bethune on campus highlighted her passion for reconciliation stating, "This

shall always be before me as a great interracial garden where men and women of all tongues, all nations, all creeds, all classes blend together helping to send out sunshine and love and peace and brotherhood that makes a better

world in which to live." Students dug deeper into the theme of justice through a visit to the National Memorial for Peace & Justice, which honors victims of lynching and injustice. In addition to visiting HBCUs, teens were excited to visit Auburn University, who had just made it to the men's Final Four tournament, and Southeastern Universi-

ty, a Christian university. A favorite highlight for all students was visiting the Atlantic Ocean. To cap off the trip, there was a mini Tall Turf reunion as several of the adult leaders, Maribel Cano, LeMarr Jackson and Charity Runyon Babista, were former Tall Turf LITs. Overall, it was a powerful trip exploring colleges and God's heart for justice.
